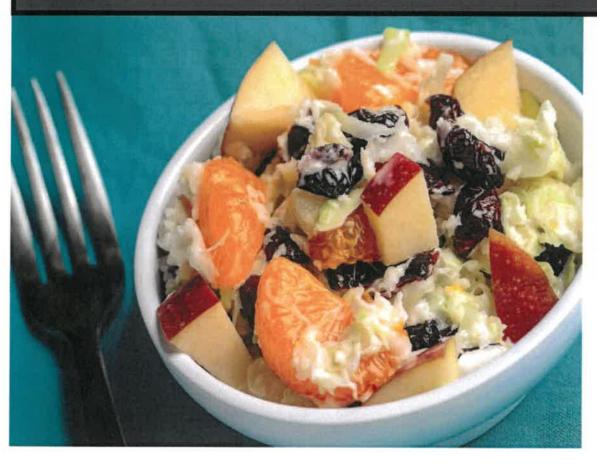

Calendar Recipe

Fruited Coleslaw



- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1/2 teaspoon apple cider vinegar (or any type of vinegar)
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 3 tablespoons crushed pineapple canned in 100% juice, including juice
- 2 cups shredded or finely chopped cabbage
- 1/2 cup chopped apples (or fruit of choice: orange, mandarin oranges, pear)
- 1/2 cup raisins or dried cranberries
- Wash hands with warm water and soap, scrubbing for at least 20 seconds.

- 2. Wash fresh produce under cool running water, using a vegetable brush to scrub veggies with a firm surface. Dry and cut to prepare for this recipe.
- Combine mayonnaise, vinegar, sugar, and pineapple in a small bowl. Stir to mix well.
- **4.** In another bowl, combine cabbage and other fruit.
- **5.** Pour dressing over cabbage and fruit. Stir to mix.
- 6. Serve right away.
- 7. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

Roasted Veggie Potatoes

Simple. Yummy. Filling. What more could you ask for? Try this recipe for roasted veggie potatoes and soon you'll be roasting all types of vegetables.



Ingredients:

- Cooking Spray
- 3 medium potatoes, washed and cubed
- 1 bell pepper, chopped
- 1 onion, chopped,
- 1/2 cup, fresh green beans
- 3 teaspoons vegetable oil
- 1 teaspoon dried rosemary
- 1/2 teaspoon salt



Servings: 8,

Directions:

- Preheat the oven to 450 degrees F.
- 2. Coat a baking sheet with cooking spray.
- 3. Place potatoes, bell pepper, onion and green beans in a large bowl.
- 4. Put the oil, rosemary, and salt in a small bowl. Stir together.
- 5. Pour the oil mixture over the vegetables. Stir to coat evenly.
- 6. Spread the vegetables on the baking sheet.
- 7. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Turn and check for desired browning after 10 minutes.

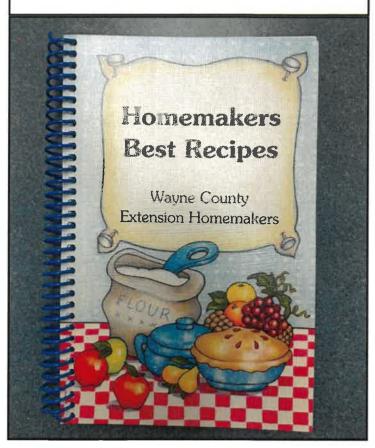

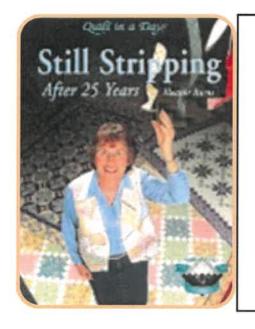

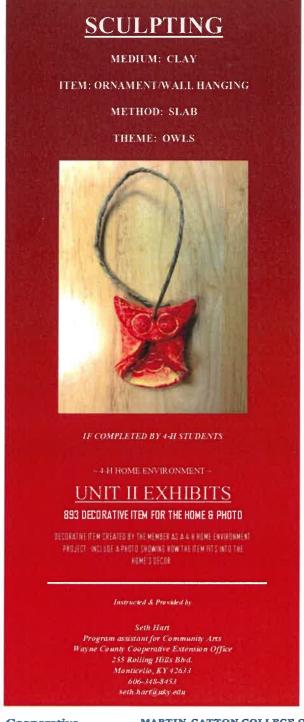

Construction

- Roll out a ball of clay and press it into a flat 3 inch wide slab (no less than 1/4 inches thick).
- Place the rim of a plastic cup facedown onto the clay slab.
 Cut around it, using a tooth pick.
- With a marker lid tip, create the effect of feathers by pressing half of it into the clay slab (lines should be curved/think "U" lines).
- · Fold in the left and right edges until those edges touch. Also fold the top edge, overlapping the other two edges.
- To create eyes, press the in a full circle with the marker lid tip. To create pupils, press in smaller circles using a stirrer straw.
- With a toothpick, draw a "V" shaped beak.
- Create hole in the top, using a stirrer straw.



Final Touches: Self Hardening Clay

- If using self hardening day, allow 24 to 48 hours for clay to dry (have a blow dryer on hand for faster drying time if needed).
- Using steel wool, sand it off before painting.
- Apply acrylic paints.
- Add twine of your choice for hanging and display.

Final Touches: Firing Clay

- If using firing clay, allow 5 to 7 days for clay to dry.
- Using steel wool, sand it off before firing.
- Fire to bisque (cone 06).
- Either paint or glaze after firing. If glazing, fire once more to (cone 06) or mid range (cone 5-7).

Take Safety Seriously This Summer By Stephanie Ramsey (June 27, 2023)

June is National Safety Month. While safety matters every day, during June it gets the extra recognition it deserves. To observe National Safety Month, the Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center (KIPRC), housed in the University of Kentucky College of Public Health, compiled these tips from its research and prevention efforts to help keep you safe at home, on vacation and anywhere else this summer. The warm, long days of summer are the perfect time to be outside. But summertime adventures come with risks, whether you're spending your summer by the water, at the playground, or setting off fireworks at your festivities. Knowing how to stay safe is vital for everyone.

Water Safety:

Being in the water is a great way to cool down in the summer. However, safety precautions are imperative for everyone's wellbeing. Remember, drowning can happen in a matter of seconds. From 2016 through 2021, there were 543 emergency department (ED) visits by Kentucky residents for unintentional drowning injuries. Most were kids under the age of 5. Before you take a dip in the water or go out on a boat with your loved ones, review these water safety tips:

- Learn how to be safe around water by taking water safety, rescue, and swimming lessons.
- Lock and fence off swimming pools and ponds completely.
- Use life jackets in and around lakes, ponds, rivers, and other water bodies. Choose the right life jacket for the activities you will be doing. Double check to make sure the life jackets are U.S. Coast Guard approved and fit correctly.
- Never leave kids alone and unsupervised when around water.
- Check the weather and water conditions before you go. For more KSPAN prevention briefs, visit the KSPAN website.

Fireworks Safety:

Many celebrate the Fourth of July with barbecues and fireworks. Fireworks may be a fun spectacle but setting them off yourself is risky. In 2020, there were 18 deaths and over 15,000 injuries related to fireworks nationally, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Follow these tips for a safe celebration:

- Never let kids use fireworks (including sparklers, which are dangerous if someone is poked with one).
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy to extinguish any unexpected fires.
- If a firework fuse burns down but the firework doesn't detonate, leave it alone for at least 10 minutes and then put it in water.
- Never point a firework at another person, animal, or property.
- Have a designated adult shooter for fireworks, as alcohol and fireworks don't mix.
- Obey all local laws.

Playground Safety:

Playgrounds are a great way to let kids let off some steam and get exercise in the summertime. But youths aged 17 and younger are at particular risk for falls on playgrounds. Kentucky youth averaged 2,069 visits to an emergency department due to playground falls annually from 2016–2021. Keeping track of kids on the playground can be difficult. Use the following checklist to keep your children protected:

- Does the surface surrounding the playground equipment have at least a foot of materials (mulch, sand, wood chips, etc.) to protect against injuries from falls?
- Make sure the protective surfaces you just checked off the list extend at least 6 feet in all directions from the playground equipment.
- Look for protruding fasteners (bolts), sharp points and edges, and other hardware that can pose dangers to kids.
- Look for tripping hazards. These can include raised surfaces, exposed concrete footings, rocks and tree roots.
- Make sure all elevated surfaces have guardrails to help prevent falls and injuries.
- Regularly check playground equipment and surfaces.
- Supervise your kids when they are on the playground.

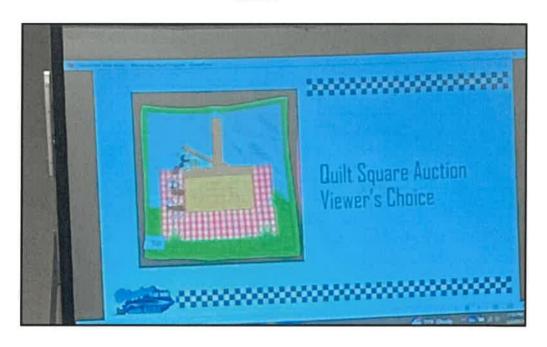
